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### **Perfect English Grammar**

In the grammar of some modern languages, particularly of English, the perfect may be analyzed as an aspect that is independent of tense - the form that is traditionally just called the perfect ("I have done") is then called the present perfect,

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while the form traditionally called the pluperfect ("I had done") is called the past perfect.

The present perfect of any verb is composed of two elements : the appropriate form of the auxiliary verb to have (present tense), plus the past participle of the main verb. The past participle of a regular verb is base +ed , e.g. played, arrived, looked .

The second sentence is in the Present Perfect tense. We use the Present Perfect for actions and situations which are in the past (or which start in the past) but which have a connection with the present. For example, if I say "I have been to London", the connection is that I can remember this experience now.
